On the weekend of the 20th and 21st November, twenty-one Ruislip High School sixth formers attended the LIMUN: High School Sixth Edition Conference in person at King's College London's Waterloo campus.

Each of our students represented a different country on a wide range of diverse committees, debating a true plethora of different topics. For example, on the World Health Organisation committee, insightful debates were held on combating medical misinformation in the digital age, with our students representing countries as varied as Colombia, Ghana and Germany in this committee alone.

Whilst at the event, students had the chance to hear talks by an inspiring group of speakers, such as Kitack Lim, the Secretary General of the International Maritime Organisation, and Emtithal Mahmoud, a Goodwill Ambassador for the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR), who performed her inspirational poem Di Baladna (Our Land).

All of our students represented the school impeccably and it was a real privilege to be able to take them to such a prestigious event for the first time. A special mention must go out though to one of our students, Simon, who was given the Most Improved Delegate award on the London Platform for Change committee for his work representing the UK.
