KING LEAR



On Tuesday 17th and Wednesday 18th December, 2024, the RHS Drama
Department once again delighted audiences with a phenomenal
performance of Shakespeare's King Lear. Featuring students from Year 1013, the Winter production was a stunning testament to our students'
dedication and creative talent.

The entire cast were spectacular, with the students' love for performing shining through. In particular, James, Year 11, in the role of King Lear, delivered an emotionally charged portrayal that commanded the stage. In addition, Julian showed how hard work can pay off, through his thoughtful performance of Edgar. Other notable performers were Isabel, Year 11, who played Goneril; Jess, Year 11, in the role of Kent; and Max, Year 12, as one of the play's antagonists, Edmund. For all of these students – and many of the members of the cast – their performances were particularly impressive as they balanced a tough rehearsal schedule with preparing for their GCSEs and A Levels.

As we break up at the end of another 'phenomenal' term at the school, I wanted to take a moment to express my deep gratitude to the whole Ruislip High School community for their support and partnership as we collectively strive to make RHS 'a great and safe place' for all stakeholders.

What a term it has been! I write this article having just attended the second night of our drama department's production of King Lear. I can honestly say that I was

transfixed throughout the performance and so impressed by the quality of the students' acting and delivery throughout the play. I spoke briefly at the end of the evening to highlight how impressed I had been with the ambition shown by all involved. I was particularly impressed that students not only performed but also managed backstage operations, sound, and lighting with incredible professionalism.

The performance of King Lear wasn't the only high-calibre evening we have hosted this term and I, along with the audience present, were also thoroughly entertained last week at our annual winter concert. The quality of the student performances was again exceptional, and I end the term feeling genuine pride at leading a school where students display such skill and confidence, this is testament to their hard work and the dedication and commitment of the RHS staff.

It has been a very busy end of term even by Ruislip High standards. December has seen Year 8 go to Paris and Year 11 spend the day in central London. I have heard nothing but positive feedback from both trips and am particularly impressed with how the Year 8 students dealt with the adverse weather conditions that affected both channel crossings. As Miss Farrell told me, it takes more than the weather to dampen the spirits of Year 8 at Ruislip High and I would also like to thank all of those parents/guardians who took the time to write such lovely messages to the staff involved, it meant a great deal.

The term has also been exceptionally busy academically and the 'Geography news' article is particularly interesting regarding how we support and prepare students for academic success here at the school. The Department for Education published their annual performance tables earlier this month and I was delighted that Ruislip High School's progress 8 score for the 2024 Year 11 cohort was 0.62. This is equivalent to students from the school achieving, on average, almost ¾ of a grade above the national average in each of their subjects. Our A-level results also placed us firmly in the top 25% of all schools nationally and are testament to the outstanding, inclusive education we provide at the school.

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I wanted to reflect at this time of year that, although Christmas is a time of peace and love, unfortunately, for some members of our community, Christmas can be a challenging time. I believe it is important to acknowledge this at a time of year where the overriding media message is one of celebration. 

These projects followed the residential field trip to the Norfolk coastline in June where students collected their own data over a four-day period. Year 13s then moved on to start the final two topics of the course: Water and Carbon Cycles (physical geography); and Global Systems and Global Governance (human geography).

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GCSE



Year 9


Year 9 topics have included International Development, the Americas and Brazil. The Americas topic has involved students learning about the changing name of North America's highest mountain, with website reports such as this:

Year 7

An Inspector Calls

We are members of one body", reads a well-known quote from An Inspector Calls, and Year 11 certainly were as they all gathered together on 11th November to watch Central Youth Theatre deliver an incredible workshop on this exam text.



Opening with a description of the key ideas in any text: themes, structure and form, Holly, the lead actor, used a football metaphor (especially appreciated by the audience's Liverpool fans) to help clarify these concepts. Once they understood the basics, the actors proceeded to act out individual scenes, and teach the students to understand them in interactive, workshop-style sessions. Key quotes were analysed, and character development explained, but the team also drew attention to more theatrical choices, harder to demonstrate in the classroom. These included props, entrances and exits, and costume choices, such as Sheila's ornate, expensive scarf symbolising her materialism, and Eric's jacket that he wore in different styles from the beginning to the end of the play, representing his progression as a character.

Year 11 listened attentively throughout the whole workshop, enjoyed the performance and found it very useful as exam revision for their upcoming PPEs. If only going to the theatre always counted as revision!


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Othello: stage props and Traveller's Tales lecture by Chloé Houston

On 25th November 2024, the Year 13 English class was given the opportunity to listen to a fascinating lecture given by Chloé Houston on how stage props are used in Othello, alongside the idea of Othello as "other" within his own narrative. Houston explored ideas concerning Othello's Traveller's Tales and how he is both an insider and an outsider as "The Moor of Venice". Yet the focus of Houston's lecture was in regard to the handkerchief and the connotations and significance driven by it.

Houston began discussing the given information about the handkerchief, what Shakespeare wants the audience to know, for example, we know that Othello says it is a gift from his mother and we also know that the strawberry embroidery is emblematic of blood. However, Houston then started to expand on its significance, initially looking into their history as a material item. She discussed how the handkerchief was an important part of material culture during the Renaissance period and how it was a very personal item, seldom shared with others. Handkerchiefs were also symbolic of beauty, cleanliness, good breeding and fine taste alongside being representative of a woman's domestic labour. After looking into the history of the handkerchief, Houston begins to explore its movement on stage and how the story of the handkerchief associates Othello with another world, a romantic, fanciful world, furthering his "otherness". Houston concluded her talk when discussing the actual meanings behind the handkerchief and how it can hold many meanings, possibly contradictory to each other. Houston then opened the floor to discussion and allowed us to ask her further questions in detail regarding the subject matter of her lecture and the play as a whole.

It was an incredible opportunity to hear from a specialist and study stage props in such detail, as Houston opened our minds to concepts and connotations we had never even considered before. The entire talk was informative, creative and extremely insightful, presented in a professional yet enjoyable manner. The entire class is extremely grateful for Houston's lecture and the time she gave us and we thank her greatly for sharing her knowledge with us all.

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Boccia Competition

This week some of our students took part in a Boccia competition at Pield Heath. Boccia has roots in ancient Greece and Egypt and is thought to be one of the first games played by mankind. The sport was originally designed for people with Cerebral Palsy but is now

played by people with a wide range of disabilities.

The game is played from a seated position: players propel balls to land as close as possible to a white marker ball, known as the Jack. Two sides compete as individuals, pairs or as a team of three over a set number of ends (4 for individuals and pairs, and 6 for teams).

At the Pield Heath competition, the students from RHS played seven different games, all of which were really competitive. Students won four games, lost two and drew one, resulting in 4th place overall.

UKMT Senior MATHS Challenge 2024 - 2025

Ruislip High School students showcased their mathematical brilliance at the annual Senior Maths Challenge, held on Tuesday, 1st October 2024. The challenge, organized by the UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT), is a prestigious competition designed to test problem-solving and logical reasoning skills among A-level and advanced GCSE students across the nation.

This year, a record number of Ruislip High participants took part, with 80 of our senior students from Year 11, Year 12 and Year 13 stepping up to tackle the challenge's notoriously complex problems. The competition consists of a series of thought-provoking questions that demand creative approaches, rewarding precision and out-of-the-box thinking.

The UKMT Maths Clubs, run weekly by Ms. Jani, are designed to inspire and challenge students through a variety of problem-solving activities and advanced mathematical concepts. From sharpening logical reasoning skills to exploring the intricacies of number theory and geometry, the clubs provide an engaging and supportive environment for students to grow their mathematical confidence and ability. These clubs, which have become a cornerstone of the school's mathematics enrichment program, played a crucial role in nurturing the talent and skills of our aspiring mathematicians.

The results were nothing short of outstanding. Alvin received a Gold certificate, whilst Dorrian, Rahul, Sophia, Samy, Ethan, Kimaya and Maxim received Silver certificates. Many of our students also earned Bronze certificates, a testament to their hard work, dedication, and mathematical prowess. Ruislip High School is celebrating a historic milestone as Alvin Choy was invited to participate in the British Mathematical Olympiad (BMO) for the first time in the school's history! This prestigious invitation follows their outstanding performance in the Annual Senior Maths Challenge where their exceptional score placed them among the top 1% of participants nationwide.

Ms. Jani, Maths Across the curriculum coordinator at Ruislip High School, praised the students' achievements: "The Senior Maths Challenge is a rigorous test of skill, and our students consistently impress us with their determination and talent. We're incredibly proud of their accomplishments and look forward to seeing them take on even greater challenges in the future."

We have two hands to help, and two ears to listen,


But only one time in school, so make sure it glistens.



Forty three students, made up of Year 10 and Year 11 GCSE Spanish students, visited Barcelona during the October half-term for four days. The group stayed in Salou, a beach-side resort about an hour from Barcelona. On the first day students spent the afternoon in Tarragona, a picturesque town thirty minutes away from Salou. There they viewed a Roman Amphitheatre and spent time in the old town in small groups. In the evening students had dinner in a typical Spanish Tapas restaurant to sample some of Spain's culinary delights.






