Reading in Art, Craft and Design

To be an effective artist and designer, students will read like a subject expert. This means students will:

- Be able to understand and apply key terminology
- Understand how to select appropriate information from a variety of sources
- Be able to analyse the work of artists and designers both verbally and written
- Express their opinions using subject-specific language

Typical texts that students will encounter in Art, Craft and Design lessons are:

- Websites about artists or designers
- Step-by-step instructions
- Success criteria
- Exemplar analysis

Students will be taught the following strategies that are specific to reading like and Artist or Designer:

- Interpretation of Art pieces and conversion into verbal or written responses
- Summarising videos so that the appropriate knowledge is gained from
- Structured and guided analysis focusing on specific areas or themes
- Skimming more complex text to help identify areas that need more time and accuracy
- Analysing the deeper meaning of visual language
- Evaluation as a form of self reflection and development

Students are taught the key vocabulary in Art, Craft and Design by:

- Low-stakes testing
